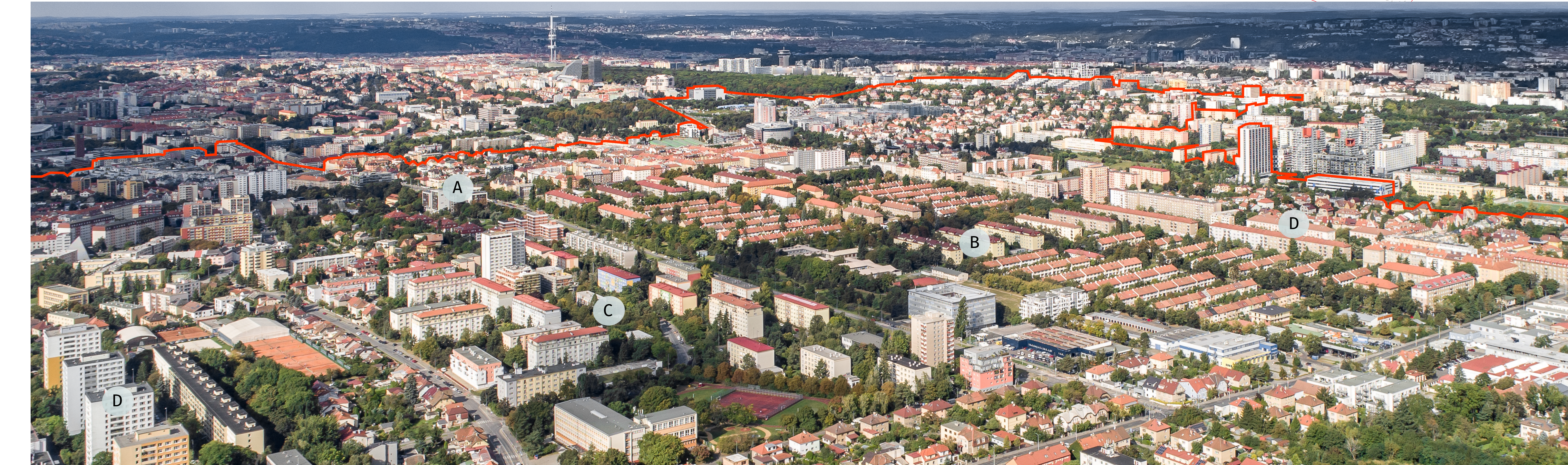


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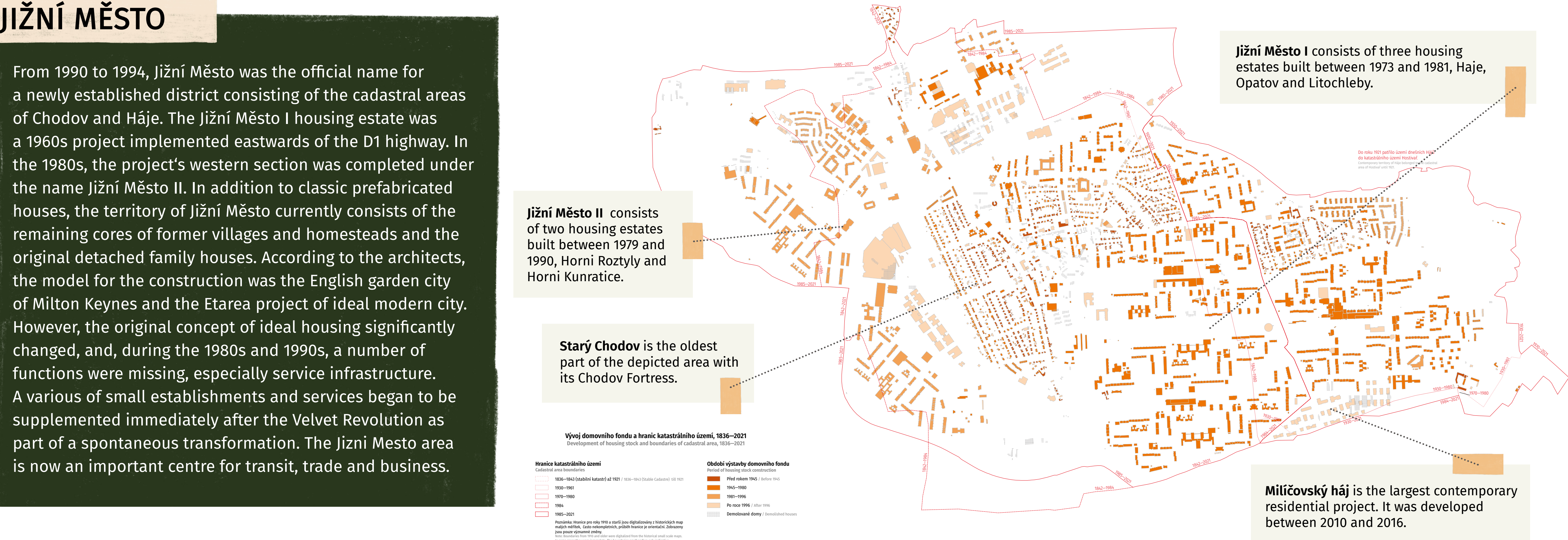
STRAŠNICE

Part of Greater Prague since 1922, Strašnice is a district on the very edge of today's inner city. Nowadays, it is part of the Prague 3 and Prague 10 districts. Almost every decade of the last 150 years has left its mark on Strašnice. The district is thus a mosaic of distinctive localities differing in the type of housing, the characteristics of the original inhabitants for whom the houses were built and the current inhabitants. The neighbourhood offers a diverse range of housing types: a villa quarter, family house colonies, tenement houses in traditional block structures from the first half of the 20th century, several rather smaller housing estates from the socialist period and several residential developments from the post-socialist period. In addition, there were and are several areas with non-residential functions: the current Hostivařsko-Malešická industrial area, manufacturing facilities in the area of Průběžná Street, and the partly unused spaces of Hagibor.



JIŽNÍ MĚSTO

From 1990 to 1994, Jižní Město was the official name for a newly established district consisting of the cadastral areas of Chodov and Haje. The Jižní Město I housing estate was a 1960s project implemented eastwards of the D1 highway. In the 1980s, the project's western section was completed under the name Jižní Město II. In addition to classic prefabricated houses, the territory of Jižní Město currently consists of the remaining cores of former villages and homesteads and the original detached family houses. According to the architects, the model for the construction was the English garden city of Milton Keynes and the Etabea project of ideal modern city. However, the original concept of ideal housing significantly changed, and, during the 1980s and 1990s, a number of functions were missing, especially service infrastructure. A various of small establishments and services began to be supplemented immediately after the Velvet Revolution as part of a spontaneous transformation. The Jižní Město area is now an important centre for transit, trade and business.



Jižní Město II consists of two housing estates built between 1979 and 1990, Horní Rožtyly and Horní Kunratice.

Starý Chodov is the oldest part of the depicted area with its Chodov Fortress.

Milíčovský háj is the largest contemporary residential project. It was developed between 2010 and 2016.

Jižní Město I consists of three housing estates built between 1973 and 1981, Haje, Opatov and Litochleby.
